

Plenty of storylines in Falcons-Eagles

Second week of the NFL season. Sunday Night national NBC broadcast. Philadelphia vs. Atlanta as two of the NFC contenders tangle. Oh yeah, and Michael Vick returning to Atlanta as the starting quarterback of a team that Mike Smith just cannot seem to beat, facing the new face of the Atlanta franchise. I guess I should lead with this story, right?

The Atlanta Falcons hosted the Philadelphia Eagles on NBC last Sunday night and the angles were exactly what you'd thought they'd be from NBC. Vick returning to the city he used to "own" as a member of the Falcons. Vick did all of the interviews the week leading up to the game, saying he was happy to be in Philadelphia, this is Matt Ryan's team now, blah blah blah. NBC showed clips from the Vick interview with Bob Costas ad nauseam in its pregame show leading up to the 8:20 p.m. start. The interesting thing is, I thought NBC did a nice job of also mentioning the Falcons' new regime that took over in the aftermath of the Vick scandal. When the game started, Al Michaels and Cris Collinsworth certainly seemed to be playing up Vick and the Eagles with little regard to the team that earned the NFC's No.1 seed entering the playoffs one year ago. Several callers pointed out—and I agree with them—that it did seem the broadcast was Philadelphia-heavy, but the Eagles were the offseason's sexy story.

SAME OLD VICK ...

What I thought was funny was how Vick claimed to be a reformed man in all of those interviews, but after he was knocked out of the game he was taunting the crowd and pointing at the scoreboard as boos cascaded down upon him. Vick's performance in the game summed up his time in Atlanta, electrifying at times, filled with turnovers, highlighted by an injury and then ending unsatisfactorily. Atlanta fans actually were (at least should have been) happy about that last part.

STATE OF FOOTBALL



Tech, Dawgs, Falcons all victorious

Pootball is the sport most beloved in Georgia, and within this state there are three programs that make the natives tick. There are also three drastically different moods in Athens, Atlanta and Flowery Branch, where the Georgia Bulldogs, Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets and Atlanta Falcons all find themselves in a variety of positions early in the season.

GEORGIA TECH ...

Paul Johnson's tenure at Tech had fans inspired after just two seasons at the helm, with his new option offense taking the ACC by storm and pacing the Yellow Jackets to the Orange Bowl after winning their conference in 2009. But an underwhelming 6-7 season last year left many to believe that Tech had returned to its mediocre ways.

However, after a promising 3-0 start heading into conference play, hope is alive and well at Bobby Dodd Stadium.

The biggest victory of the three was last week's 66-24 dismantling of the Kansas Jayhawks, who defeated Johnson's boys last year in Lawrence. Johnson's dynamic offense was back and better than ever last Saturday, racking up 768 yards of total offense in the win. That includes 604 yards on the ground, also a school record.

The stats show that GT has a good

backfield, one that could perhaps rival the fine running game previously led by current Steelers' running back Jonathan Dwyer in 2009. Filling the Dwyer void are the experienced Roddy Jones, Embry Peeples and Orwin Smith (who scored on a 95-yard touchdown on the first offensive play from scrimmage against KU).

The key will likely come at quarterback, where Tevin Washington faces the difficult task of replacing Josh Nesbitt. Sure, Johnson's offense is based on the run, but a quarterback must be ready to pass the football should the Jackets have to come from behind (something that even Nesbitt was inconsistent doing).

Granted, it's still very early and Tech fans need not get too carried away after three consecutive wins that have come against relatively lackluster competition. But the ACC appears to be wide open as per usual, and surely Tech is among the group of squads looking to separate themselves from the rest this fall.

GEORGIA ...

It's a different story in Athens, where an 0-2 start put head coach Mark Richt squarely on the hot seat and brought on perhaps the most scrutiny regarding the state of the program since

the hopelessly average Ray Goff era.

With a relatively simple schedule (by SEC standards) in front of the Bulldogs, there is still time to turn things around between the hedges. But UGA's problems of seasons past were once again on display in defeats to Boise State and South Carolina. A lack of overall discipline and execution cost the Dawgs a chance at staying competitive with BSU and a victory that was there for the taking versus the Gamecocks.

These types of problems are nothing new. Georgia was one of the most penalized teams in the SEC last year and the defense has long been a weakness after being the anchor of the team early on in the Richt era.

Simply put, we're just three games into the season and it's already crunch time in Athens. Fortunately, the schedule is not the hardest. Trips to Ole Miss (blown out by Vandy last week) and Tennessee (still rebuilding), sandwiched around a home game against Mississippi State (perhaps not as good as expected) over the next three weeks are all winnable, plus Alabama and LSU are both off the schedule.

Add in the immediate impact of touted freshman Isaiah Crowell at running back and the continued starring play of Aaron Murray under center, and things do look good on one side of the ball (although the line play must get better).

Should we see some improvement from Todd Grantham's enigmatic defense, things could turn around in a big way in Athens.

But while the talent is there to make a run, Dawg fans are all too used to that same story of near-misses. The real question is whether UGA will suddenly find some discipline and poise in a league that requires both in order to be successful.

Now, after an unmemorable 59-0 win over Coastal Carolina, Richt and company need to steer the ship back onto its course or they won't be sailing for much longer.

ATLANTA FALCONS ...

Looking beaten and battered in a humiliating 30-12 loss at Chicago in Week 1, the Falcons returned home last Sunday night to face Michael Vick and the high-flying Philadelphia Eagles in what was a borderline mustwin game.

In some ways, the same sloppiness and inconsistencies that plagued Atlanta at Soldier Field were on display. But this time the Falcons displayed one of the main qualities of a Mike Smith team—fighting for 60 minutes.

Atlanta showed great resolve, battling back from 10 points down in the fourth quarter en route a massive 35-31 win, which helped it avoid a dreaded 0-2 start.

For a team that has been known to execute in all aspects, the early-season mistakes can't make the coaching staff happy. But similar problems are prevalent across the NFL, where teams are struggling to hit their strides after being locked out for most of the offseason.

In the end, the core is similar to that of last season but also surely improved thanks to acquisitions made by general manager Thomas Dimitroff. He signed defensive end Ray Edwards, who recovered a Vick fumble in the red zone and rumbled deep into Philly territory to set up a touchdown, and drafted wide receiver Julio Jones, whose huge catch on third-and-12 in the fourth quarter kept Atlanta's first scoring drive of the stanza alive.

Jones appears to be fitting nicely into an offense that includes weapons such as Tony Gonzalez, Roddy White and Michael Turner. If the pass-blocking improves, the pieces are there for one of the best units in the league.

Offensively, though, much rests on the shoulders of Matt Ryan. The fourth-year man has been good under center, but he made far too many mistakes in the first two matchups and needs to continue improving if he wants to become the elite QB that the Falcons want.

What the Falcons really want is a run to the Super Bowl. After Sunday's win over perhaps the NFC's most talented team, that still seems a distinct possibility for last year's NFC South Champs.

Clearly, there is still work to do for all three of the Peach State's major programs. But in a state thoroughly obsessed with football, there will always be potential for big things when it comes to the Falcons, Dawgs, Jackets and even Georgia State and Southern.

The question is whether the squads have the right ingredients to bring it all together. And that is where the trio of teams differ greatly at the present time, as the Falcons look poised to perform well in the long run, while the Yellow Jackets hope to be headed into the ACC's elite under Johnson, and the Bulldogs just want to start winning again before it's too late.

But no matter how you slice it, the next several months should be very interesting to watch, as three programs try and find success this season any way they can.

Tech's schedule





will be a stiff test for Johnson's option offense, but it will also be a good measuring stick going forward to gauge the possible success of this


NATIONAL RECOGNITION ...

One injury of note for Georgia State concerns Albert Wilson. After setting a school record with 146 yards receiving on six catches, Wilson pulled a hamstring




