Signing Day overshadows Super Bowl

Maybe it is because Georgia has become one of the top football talent-producing states in the country and the fact that the Falcons were bounced early from the football playoffs, but did it not seem that National Signing Day was a much bigger deal than the Super Bowl this year?

SUPER WEDNESDAY ...

Across the radio airwaves and on every single newspaper site in the state, it was National Signing Day that soaked up more hours and more pages of coverage than the game that decided the NFL's champion. Even the radio stations didn't seem to send the prime time shows to radio row. Buck & Kincade repre-

sented 680 The Fan as the morning show and afternoon drive show both remained in Atlanta. Meanwhile, Steak Shapiro of 790 tweeted from Indianapolis Saturday but did not do any shows from the site of Super Bowl XLVI.

The AJC had a blog that was updated every few minutes with the latest commitments and the Gwinnett Daily Post, Valdosta Daily Times and Columbus Ledger-Enquirer ran stories the day before, day of and day after all about the top players and where they were going. The Marietta Daily Journal had a nice recap about the top players in Cobb County, and of course Score Atlanta had it covered.

The Score Newsletter went out extra

early, complete with predictions of 10 of the up-in-the-air prospects, and Score produced a second newsletter last Wednesday, wrapping up the day that was. If you followed Score Atlanta on twitter, you saw exclusive pictures from Buford and North Gwinnett's signing ceremonies and you were treated to the actual video of Tucker's Josh Dawson announcing he would attend the University of Georgia.

Score Atlanta's Fletcher Proctor also recapped National Signing Day on Football Night in Atlanta with John Michaels on Sports Radio 790 The Zone, and he shared some insight on some of the metro players headed to Georgia Southern with the Eagles Radio Network. Score was also able to have Chris Lionetti in Athens covering UGA and Thomas Watson on the Flats covering Georgia Tech. Robby Kalland was also able to snag an exclusive interview with Georgia State football coach Bill Curry.

Score had National Signing Day covered as it seemed as though that is what everyone in Atlanta cared about last week, moreso than the Super Bowl. I am sure National Signing Day would have been a footnote had the Falcons been playing in the big game, but as it

was, Atlanta gave much more of a rip about the future of the college game than the present of the professional game.

LOOKING AHEAD ...

With winter sports coming to a close, the traditional wrestling as well as the swimming and diving championships will be decided. The Score newsletter has ramped up its swimming coverage all week long with daily stories previewing the championships, and next week the newsletter will get down with the wrestling championships. Giants win frustrates Falcons fans

The Super Bowl XLVI rematch between the Giants and Patriots looked a lot like Super Bowl XLII. Another Giant, this time Mario Manningham, made an incredible catch with two defenders on his back to key the Giants' winning drive. The catch was similar to David Tyree's catch four years ago, but not as spectacular. New York scored with under a minute to play just like they did in 2008. Tom Brady's desperation heave was knocked away and the Giants were the champions again. It was one of the great Super Bowls of all time and established Eli Manning, the game's MVP, as one of the greatest quarterbacks of our generation.

Every NFL fan hopes that his/her team will finish as the Super Bowl champions at the end of every season. Watching another year go by without the Falcons winning a championship is frustrating, especially because the Giants beat Atlanta in the playoffs. This could have been the Falcons' year. Last year should have been the Falcons' year.

Now that the season is finished, everything starts over and hope is renewed. Atlanta needs to make a decision at running back and improve the defense overall. Making a decision on whether to trade aging running back Michael Turner should be a top priority. Trad-

ing Turner for more draft picks to make up for the lost picks last year, after the Julio Jones move, makes sense. Turner will be 30 years old in 2012 and production almost always declines for running backs 30-and-over.

COOLING OFF...

After starting the season 16-6, the Hawks had lost three straight games as of Wednesday. All three losses have come at home against teams that Atlanta should beat. This season has proved more than ever that the Hawks win when Joe Johnson plays well. In the team's 16 wins, Johnson is averaging 21.4 points per game, while in the six losses, the shooting guard's point production falls to 16 a game.

In a blowout loss to Memphis, Johnson scored just 10 points. The Hawks are one of the top teams in the Eastern Conference, but if their top scorer doesn't score, they can't win. The hot start put the Hawks in a great position to earn a top seed in the playoffs, especially during a shortened season. However, a hot start doesn't clinch anything, and if the Hawks want to succeed, they must beat teams they are supposed to beat, especially at home.

NEW THREADS ...

The Braves turned back the clock and introduced a new alternate uniform this week. 1966 was the inaugural season in Atlanta and the team will wear the same uniforms that it did that season for weekend home games this year. The original uniforms are creme-colored but lack the standard tomahawk across the front. The jerseys are also missing the "screaming warrior" patch that was present on the original sleeve. Instead, there is a patch with intersecting tomahawks and the year "1876" and "Atlanta" around the edge. This was probably the politically correct move, but there are mixed opinions about that.

Some American Indian groups were against the image back in the 1980's and the Braves have been fairly compliant with their concerns since then. I don't know what those groups feel when they see that image, but I think it is a pretty cool logo. Whether you agree with the image or not, the uniform looks sharp and the Braves should represent it well.

Local racer highlights AMA Supercross

Bon Jovi once sang about being a modern day cowboy, riding a steel horse, aka a motorcycle. Sorry Jon, but you've got nothing on Davi Millsaps and the rest of the Monster Energy AMA Supercross racers who will be on display at the Georgia Dome Saturday, Feb. 25.

If you've never seen supercross, it is simply motorcycle racing involving off-road motorcycles on an artificially-made dirt track consisting of various obstacles and steep jumps. The AMA Supercross Championship events are mostly held in venues such as the Georgia Dome all across the country. The

supercross events have a high degree of difficulty and are tailored for television viewing.

DAVI ROV

One of the top racers on the AMA Supercross tour is Millsaps, a Georgia native who now calls California home. Millsaps is looking forward to returning to the Georgia Dome, an event he calls one of the highlights of his season

"It is cool to come back so my family can come watch me race," said Millsaps about the upcoming AMA Supercross stop in Atlanta. In fact it was his family that got him interested in racing when he was just three years old.

"I was riding down the road with my dad and my sister when we saw some bikes, and we wanted some." Christmas of 1991 was a happy one for Millsaps and his sister when both received small motorbikes.

After some early success, Millsaps received his first sponsor in 1995 and was winning early and often as an amateur. In 2001, Millsaps decided he wanted to ride motorcycles for a living. "I was brought into the pros in 2004 and then eventually switched to Joe Gibbs Racing," said Millsaps. "That was hard to do."

It may have seemed hard for Millsaps, but the decision for Gibbs Racing, Coy Gibbs in particular, was easy. Millsaps was one of the first racers whom Gibbs approached to ride for the newly formed motocross team. It took a while, but eventually Millsaps debuted for JGRMX in 2011. After a knee injury he began 2012 with a contract extension and he has been off to the races since.

Life as a Supercross racer may seem glamorous, but Millsaps said it is like most careers: highs and lows and not just the ones on the track. "It is amazing, but it is a job," said Millsaps of life as a professional. "Riding has to be the best job, but it is a job. We get up and do what we love to do." Millsaps noted that the travel is fun as well. "There is nothing like it, but it is a lot of work."

Typically, Millsaps said he will practice three or four days a week and travel on Fridays. The schedule depends on whether or not the circuit is in season. "I'll run three days (a week) in season or four (out of season), but you want your body to recover." Last year an injury forced him from a majority of the year, but he has recovered and is now going full bore after a title.

The injury occurred after a great 2010 for Millsaps, a year that saw him capture the Supercross 450 at San Diego, a win he calls his greatest achievement as a professional. Millsaps was fourth in the recent Anaheim race, moving him up to ninth in the season standings. The circuit will stop in San Diego, site of his huge 2010 victory, this weekend and Cowboys Stadium in Arlington next week before hitting Atlanta, an event for which Millsaps cannot wait.

HOMECOMING ...

"The (Atlanta) crowd is one of the best

on tour," said Millsaps. "It is fun and it's a great event." The scenery is also something Millsaps said he is looking forward to as he comes back to the city near where he grew up. "I have really great memories from past successes in front of my family."

Can Millsaps get the victory in front of his family? If so he will need to navigate a track that features plenty of twists and turns with jumps, mounds and hairpin turns. According to the supercrossonline.com, the Atlanta track will start with an immediate turn, followed by some fast moguls, followed by three hills in succession, a right turn followed by nine hills that crescendo then decrescendo into a stretch of straightaway. After a hairpin turn, four plateaus await the racers with three more hills quickly following. Racers will have the chance to speed into a small rhythm section then burn towards the final two hills and the finish line.

According to Millsaps, all of the tracks on the circuit are somewhat similar. "They all have the basic layout and features." Millsaps noted that once you get the jumps down, you have have to nail the rhythm section and work through the race in your mind. He said he is looking forward to the Atlanta track and hopes to have success.

"The jumps are somewhat similar (to recent races)," said Millsaps. "The layout is different but jumps are jumps."

A company called Dirt Wurx designs and builds the tracks. Hundreds of truckloads of dirt and clay are brought in and laid down on the stadium floor to form a base. More dirt is piled on to top shape the jumps, bumps and berms. After the event, Dirt Wurx has the dirt out in less than twenty-four hours, and the dirt is stored at a private location to be reused at the next event.

Millsaps will try and gather in a little momentum the next two weeks before coming to Atlanta, near his hometown of Cairo, where he hopes to put on a show. Watch to see if he pulls off his favorite move, "the dead body," to give his fans an extra thrill. If he can master the jump sequence, expect Millsaps to receive an extra charge from his east coast fans and his family, which will be in attendance to cheer on his every move.

Strong returning champs will be challenged

It has been, once again, a great year for swimming in the state of Georgia. Here we are at the state finals meet in one of the best facilities in the state for swimming: the Georgia Tech Aquatic Center.

What better place for the championship meet than a pool that once hosted Olympic swimming?

The swimming and diving championships are loaded with talented teams and athletes from metro Atlanta. While programs from Cobb and Gwinnett have owned the Class 5A titles in recent years, intown private schools like Marist and Westminster have dominated Class A-4A. Despite the usual suspects winning championships in recent years, upsets are very possible in this year's state meet.

TRADITIONAL POWERS ... Parkview won its 18th Gwinnett County championship in 21 years this season and is

among the contenders in both boys and girls this weekend. Gwinnett programs have won the past 12 Class 5A boys state crowns, and the Panthers won six of those. Their last title, however, came in 2007. Coach Jack Gayle hopes his squad returns to the winner's circle behind a state record 40 competitors in today's championships.

Meanwhile, in girls swimming, Lassiter looks to complete an unprecedented five-peat in the state's highest classification. The Troin the state's highest classification. The fro-jans are coming off their 12th county champi-onship in 13 years and are led by super sopho-mores Nicole Prendes and Micaela Janco as well as senor captain Sarah Williford.

Also from Cobb, the Walton boys will attempt to win their first state swimming title

since 1983. The Raiders won the Cobb County championship two weeks ago behind another solid performance from All-American diver David Sanchez. Lassiter will be tough to beat again, though, as Jimmy Yoder leads a stacked Trojan squad. Yoder qualified two All-American times in the Cobb meet.

TALENTED UPSTARTS ...

Although Marist has won the last five state championships in the girls Class 4A meets, Westminster upset Marist in the Wildcats' home pool at the 42nd Annual Metro Swimming and Diving Championship two weeks ago. However, the state championships this weekend are at a neutral site. We'll see how that affects the Marist-Westminster matchup and whether or not the Wildcats

see how that affects the Marist-Westminster matchup and whether or not the Wildcats can again edge the War Eagles. Regardless, Westminster will surely provide Marist with a stiff challenge and could pull off the upset yet again. Rachel Astles and Katie Christy lead the strong Westminster girls squad.

Meanwhile, after winning six state crowns in a row, the Westminster boys have not won state gold since 2008. The Wildcats, however, appear to be loaded this year and come to Georgia Tech as one of the favorites in Class 4A. But Wesleyan brings a talented bunch of Wolves into the meet as well, led by seniors Anthony McMurry and Nick Salyers,

who have each set school records in their four years on campus.

ATHLETES TO WATCH ...
One of the most accomplished swimmers in the state this year has been David Barnes of West Forsyth. Barnes didn't do much this season – other than qualifying for the state championship meet in every event and relay. A four-year varsity letterman for the Wolverines,

four-year varsity letterman for the Wolverines, Barnes has led his team in points in two consecutive years. Barnes qualified for the state meet in the 200 Free 1:55.58, 200 IM 2:10.43, 50 Free 22.51, 100 Fly 57.62, 100 Free 50.21, 500 Free 5:14.76, 100 Back 58.84, 100 Breast, 1:07.76200 Medley, 200 Free and 400 Free.

Also, in the diving portion of this weekend's activities, Jack Nyquist is the guy to watch in the boys' Class 5A competition. The junior from Alpharetta High School is the two-time defending state champion and is strongly favored to win again this year. He has only been diving for seven years, but has already proven himself as the state's best diver twice.

REGION ACTION ...

One of the top games this past weekend featured the Miller Grove boys taking on Southwest DeKalb. The Wolverines were able to come away with a narrow 59-53 win over the Panthers to complete the season sweep and earn a slim lead over the Panthers for the No. 2 seed in the Region 6-4A tournament. The Wolverines also defeated Lithonia on Tuesday 75-42 to strengthen their lead over the Panthers.

Over in Class 5A, Shiloh continues to play great basketball as the Generals took down Parkview 67-36 over the weekend to hold a firm grip on Region 8-5A, However, they almost lost that grip on Tuesday, as they barely got by South Gwinnett, 59-58. Robert Carter and Jordan Gaither each had 14 points, but Kyle Lewis shot the go-ahead three-pointer with 25 seconds left to give the Generals the crucial win.

Over in Region 7-5A, defending state champion Norcross has the lead in the region, but North Gwinnett is not far behind. The Bulldogs got another big win against Meadowcreek 66-42 Chris Bolden led the team with 15 points while Kwesi Abakah scored 10 points and pulled down five boards. The Bulldogs are 11-2 in the region and are right on Norcross' heels.

ANOTHER RUN? ...

And speaking of Norcross, are the Blue Devils going to be a darkhorse to win the state title, even though they are the defending champions? The Blue Devils are going through a tough stretch this season, suffering nine loses including a 62-42 shellacking against Mill Creek.

That said they did lose nine games last

That said, they did lose nine games last year during their state title run. However, their last loss came against North Gwinnett of Jan. 18 last year. This year has not been the same story as the Blue Devils have lost three of their last eight games. They will have a huge contest tonight when they take on North Gwinnett which will be for the No. 1 seed in

But are they still one of the top teams in

5A? They are not ranked in the top 10, and with the way North Gwinnett is playing, it will be interesting to see how the Blue Devils can hold up against their rivals as well as teams like Shiloh, Wheeler, Westlake and last

year's state runner-up Milton.

And speaking of Milton, the Eagles are looking like the favorites to win the state title for the second time in three years. They have won 16 consecutive games, and the last time they lost a game was on Dec. 10 when the Eagles fell to Tift County 57-52. With a team that features Evan Nolte, Charles Mann and Shaq Johnson (who had seven dunks in the first half against North Forsyth last Tuesday), the Eagles seem to improve each game and will be tough to beat once tournament play begins.

NO DIAMOND NEEDED ... Losing Diamond DeShields was a huge

blow for the Norcross Lady Blue Devils, and head coach Angie Hembree had to make certain that her team plays consistent basket ball down the stretch. The Blue Devils have done that and more, winning their last six games including an 81-40 win over Meadowcreek. Patrice Butler has been stepping up in DeShields' absence as she had 22 points and 12 rebounds in the win against the Mustangs.

Previewing state championship meet

In the girls Class 5A meet, Lassiter has reloaded after a trio of stars graduated in 2011
to swim at the next level in Division I and
remains the favorite. Recently the Trojans
captured their 12th Cobb County championship in their last 13 appearances. A virtual
two-team race between Lassiter and Walton
saw the Trojans edge the Raiders 542-522.5.

Brookwood and Mill Creek, which finished second and third behind Lassiter at the
2011 state meet, should once again contend.

The Marist girls have won five state
titles in a row in Class A-4A. However,
Westminster looks poised to turn the tide
and end Marist's streak after triumphing at
the Metro Swimming and Diving Championship, where the host Wildcats won with
212 points to the runner-up War Eagles' 193.

WINNING WILDCATS ...

On the boys side, the story is much different—especially in Class A-4A. Westminster's string of six consecutive state titles came to an end in 2009 and there have been four different state champions in the past four years. The Wildcats last triumphed in 2008, followed by Marist, Greater Atlanta Christian and most recently Wesleyan in 2011.

Three of those schools just faced each other at the Metro Swimming and Diving

Championship and all three finished in the top four. Marist took home top honors with 153 points, Westminster was right behind with 143 and Wesleyan came in fourth with 127.

There has been a history of repeating in Class 5A. Parkview won four straight state titles from 2000 to 2003, Collins Hill went back-to-back in 2004 and 2005, Parkview followed suit with two more championships in succession then Brookwood captured a trio of titles from 2008 through 2010. Now it is Peachtree Ridge's turn to defend its 2011 championship. A repeat may not be in the cards, though, because the Lions struggled amidst a loaded field at the recent Gwinnett County Public School Championship. They finished in seventh place behind all of the recent state champions—Parkview, Collins Hill and Brookwood.

Parkview finished a mere three points behind Peachtree Ridge at last year's state meet and has to be considered the favorite to win its seventh title in the last 13 years. The Panthers, who are armed with a whole host of state qualifiers, dominated the Gwinnett competition with 1016.5 points.

It would be a big boost for team morale if the Bulldogs could pull out one of these games on the road, as the team is 1-6 in opponents' gyms this year. Fox's squad is 0-4 in SEC road games, as its lone win was at Southern California on Dec. 17.

With two games left against South Carolina and one versus LSU, Georgia has some good chances for wins later on in the schedule. Also, in recent years, the Bulldogs have been a team that has shown it can win games against teams many thought they couldn't. Still, getting to just four SEC wins seems like a steep climb at this point.

Former Fresno State head coach Pat Hill has been hired to coach the offensive line. Nolan tabbed former Miami Dolphins assistant defensive backs coach Joe Danna to mentor the Falcons' secondary in 2012. Danna was on the Atlanta staff in 2008 and 2009. Glenn Thomas has been promoted from within to replace Bob Bratkowski as the quarterbacks coach. Andrew Weidinger has also been promoted to offensive assistant.

While the coaching staff spends time getting to know (or become reacquainted with) each other and evaluating the talent on the current roster, general manager Thomas Dimitroff is busy scouting. The Falcons have 18 free agents, but Dimitroff will only aggressively

pursue signing about half that number, possibly including former Pro Bowl defensive end John Abraham and cornerback Brent Grimes.

When the NFL Combine convenes in two weeks in Indianapolis, Dimitroff, his staff and the coaches will get a look at the best college prospects available for April's draft. In the meantime, there will be considerable time spent studying college underclassmen who have declared themselves eligible for the draft. Of course, the biggest "name" underclassmen will be long gone before the Falcons make their initial selection in the second round.

Two local pass-catchers will be among the underclassmen eligible. Tight end Orson Charles from Georgia and wide receiver Stephen Hill from Tech, both could be available to the Falcons. Charles is an intriguing possibility. Future Hall of Famer Tony Gonzalez has said he'll retire after this season, so the transition timeline fits nicely.


forward Brandon Wong on Saturday, knocking him out for the season.

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
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
