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Heat turning up on Paul Johnson

When Georgia Tech hired Paul Johnson as its head coach before the 2008 season, plenty of eyebrows were raised. Could his offense really work at a big school? Will he go over well with the boosters? Can he recruit well enough to have success in the ACC? Georgia Tech fans seemed to think the answers were yes, yes and yes after beating Georgia in 2008 then going to the Orange Bowl in 2009 after winning the ACC title.

Things have gotten a little rocky since then. As Chan Gailey's players began leaving for the NFL, Johnson's record has taken a sharp detour south, and suddenly the gruff and pointed answers aren't as fun when the team is struggling to make a bowl game. Johnson has long been a character in the media with various personalities doing impressions or calling him out for not making radio appearances for one reason or another. Now the AJC is taking a shot or two at Johnson after Georgia Tech blew a second lead to an ACC foe to drop to 1-2 in conference play then fell to Middle Tennessee State.

THE HATE RAY ...

The AJC's Mark Bradley, long known for needling local coaches (see: Hewitt, Paul; Richt, Mark), recently turned his hate ray on Johnson, arguing that the Tech coach is "dragging Tech back to mediocrity."

Yes, he's the same coach who went 20-7 in his first two seasons here, beating Georgia

in Year 1 and winning the ACC title (since vacated) in Year 2," Bradley wrote in an AJC. com column. "That's the trouble: He's still the same coach and he's coaching the same way."

Bradley criticizes the way Johnson recruits and puts his players in positions to perform. He seems to believe that Johnson is simply trying to outsmart the opposition instead of getting the best players to run his offense, which he had earlier in his career at Georgia Tech.

"Johnson might think recruiting rankings don't matter, but we're seeing now the limits of a team that has talent closer to Georgia Southern's than, say, Georgia's," finished Bradley.

Johnson's gruffness continued last week at his weekly press conference, heard on Tech's flagship radio station, 790 The Zone. When asked by a reporter if he felt he still had the confidence of Tech's administration, Johnson quickly spat back at the reporter that he'd have to ask the administration after a scoff of disbelief. After several seconds of silence the reporter followed up asking if Johnson thought he still had the support of the fans, and Johnson once again pointedly responded that there seemed to be plenty of fans in the stadium Saturday.

Johnson may not like doing press conferences and interviews, but in the past, remarks such as his now-infamous Walmart reference have been a source of smiles for Georgia Tech fans. Now that things are a bit rocky, the uneasiness with the media may turn out to hurt Johnson, as folks could begin to turn on him. He certainly did himself no favors losing to Middle Tennessee State last Saturday. The underlying feeling is defensive coordinator Al Groh is certainly gone, but Johnson may receive another year. The seat, however, is very hot on the Flats.

A WELCOME ADDITION ...
Brian Finneran joined 680 The Fan's Rude Awakening recently and it has been a refreshing change to hear someone with a sports background that doesn't easily relent to Christopher Rude's antics. Georgia defense needs improvement

What a year 2011 was for the Georgia Bulldogs. What a year indeed. The Bulldogs started the season 0-2 after a horrific loss to South Carolina, but won their next 10 games to get to the SEC Championship game. That stretch, aided by one of the nation's best returning defenses, catapulted the team into the preseason top 10.

However, five games into the 2012 season, that stellar defense has yet to make an appearance.

LEAKING WATER ...

Yes, the Dawgs are 5-0 and are averaging over 47 points scored a game, but last week's game against Tennessee exposed some seri-ous chinks in the Bulldogs' armor. Tennessee has one of the better offenses in the SEC, but

the fact that the Volunteers scored 44 points on Georgia was a surprise to everyone. The Vols were able to run the ball at will and got the big play when they needed it.

What happened to a defense that held opponents to fewer than 80 rushing yards per game last year and was considered to be among the elité?

PLENTY OF EXCUSES ...

Some will blame the suspensions for Georgia's subpar defensive efforts in 2012 and while gla's subpart defensive enorts in 2012 and white there is some truth to that, it cannot shoulder the blame. Any defense would perform at less than 100 percent without players such as Alec Ogle-tree, Bacarri Rambo and Sanders Commings, but in professional and collegiate football, you make no excuses. Todd Grantham made it a

point earlier in the season that Georgia had to play who it had and he expected his players' best efforts. Yes, the suspensions hurt the defense, but saying they are the reason for a mediocre defense is the same as saying a child failed a test because he didn't have his crayon. There are multiple crayons in the crayon box and they all perform the same task.

Last season, the Georgia Bulldogs took great pride in their defense. When asked to describe the defense, Georgia coaches used the words "top" or "elite." This year, the coaches tend to stay away from those words.

"People wanted to talk about our defense and whether it was going to be a great defense," head coach Mark Richt said at his Tuesday press conference. "What I said was what I'm most concerned about is when the game is on the line, are we going to be able to make the play in the moment of truth?"

Like it or not, in the SEC, teams cannot get by with poor defensive efforts. In football, the mantra many live by is "defense wins championships." Georgia simply doesn't have a championship defense at this point.

SEC-CALIBER? ...

Most would counter the aforementioned statement with the fact that Georgia is enjoying one of its better offensive years in recent memory.

Georgia currently boasts the SEC's top offense and it is largely due to the performances of Todd Gurley, Keith Marshall and Aaron Murray. Though, in a league full of top defenses, can Georgia really rely on its of-

The answer is possibly. Games are won by putting points on the board. Numerous teams have taken this route to the national championship game in recent years. Oregon did it two years ago and Oklahoma did the same thing four years ago. Both teams

failed to win the championship because they matched up poorly against SEC defenses.

Georgia is an SEC team, so it should matchup with SEC defenses, right? Yes, but that is not my point.

My point is Georgia is performing like a team in the Pac-12 or Big XII. Great offense, but little defense. The teams in those conferences are often viewed as inferior to SEC teams because it is believed that their offenses won't be as electric against an SEC-caliber defense. That and their defense couldn't stop

their SEC opponent from running up the score.

Georgia, I feel, is in this position. The
Bulldogs can score points like the rest of the
top offenses, but if they want to win a championship, they need to find the pixie dust that turns the defense into the 2011 version. If not, a Florida or South Carolina may cut their championship run short.

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

Baseball legend nears last hurrah

With the 2012 regular season now over, Chipper Jones enters the postseason hitting .281 with 14 homers, 62 RBIs and 58 runs scored in just 386 at-bats. Those do not appear to be the numbers of a man who will be hanging up his bat and glove in a matter of days or, hopefully, weeks. But that that's exactly what Jones, 40, is doing after 19 seasons with the Atlanta Braves.

COOPERSTOWN CALLING ...

What he has done over those 19 seasons is sure to send him to the Hall of Fame, likely on the first ballot in 2017. Jones has belted 468 career home runs, the most ever among

National League switch-hitters (third overall among switch-hitters behind Mickey Mantle and Eddie Murray). Other records held by the Atlanta legend include most home runs in a season by an NL switch-hitter (45 in 1999), most consecutive games with an extra-base hit (14 in 2007) and most consecutive 20-homer seasons to begin a career (14). As of Wednesday afternoon, Jones owns 2,726 career hits, 1,623 RBIs and 1,619 runs scored to go along with a lifetime .303 batting average.

None of those gaudy numbers and statistics, however, can accurately measure what he has accomplished as a team player. Jones helped lead the Braves to 11 of their 14 consecutive division titles from 1991 to 2005 (his first full season was 1995). He has delivered three National League pennants to Atlanta in addition to the 1995 World Series title. He punched a ticket to 12 postseasons—all, of course, with the Braves.

Jones is on the brink, relatively speaking, of two career milestones. He is two productive seasons away from both 3,000 hits and 500 home runs. He's also on a young team that just made the playoffs for the second time in three years, a clear sign that Atlanta is on the rise. Alas, much to the chagrin of Braves fans, the end is here.

"Nights like tonight are really cool and I'll never forget them," Jones said back in August on Chipper Jones Bobblehead Day at Turner Field. "But I'm ready to do something else. Do I think I can come back next year and play? Yes. I don't want to. That's what people don't get. I've made promises to the most important people in my life, and I'm not going back on that promise."

SWEET SWANSONG ...

Even at 40-years old, really cool nights were the norm for Jones during the regular season. On May 2 at home he ended an ab-

solutely outrageous game against the Phillies with a two-run walkoff homer in the bottom of the 11th inning to win it 15-13. Three days later in Colorado, he tied his career high with five RBIs as the Braves erased a 6-0 deficit and won 13-9. On July 3 at Turner Field he came up with the third five-hit game of his illustrious career, going 5-for-5 with four RBIs in a 10-3 blowout of the Cubs. On Aug. 16 he treated the home crowd to his first multihomer game since June 7, 2009, blasting two dingers in a 6-0 shutout of San Diego.

All of that led to Sept. 25, when the Braves clinched a playoff spot in pulsating fashion. Trailing Miami 3-2 going into the bottom of the ninth, Jones led off the final frame with a scorching double to right-center. Next up was Freddie Freeman, who promptly delivered a two-run, 411-foot shot that sent the Turner Field faithful into delirium—and Atlanta straight into the postseason.

"Chipper's last year...it couldn't be a better story," Brian McCann exclaimed in the midst of a champagne-drenched celebration. "We were all saying that he's going to do something special."

CHOPPING FOR CHIPPER ...

Braves' manager Fredi Gonzalez was not about to sit Jones last week at Turner Field—not even once. That the Nationals had not yet clinched the NL East made the decision a nobrainer, but it's safe to say Jones would have been out there, no matter what, for his final regular season homestand. He took to Twitter before the homestand and posted the following: "To answer all ur questions....Im playing every day this week.....get ur butts to the Ted!!!"

They got their butts to the Ted alright, even though Tuesday's victory assured that the homestand would not be Jones' last appearance in Atlanta. It may not have been his last, but it was memorable.

What began with the wild win over the Marlins ended in a 5-1 record over six games and gave Braves County something to celebrate every single day. The only game Atlanta lost happened to be part of "Chipper Jones Tribute Night" last Friday.

"I was an emotional wreck," Jones told the AJC after going hitless in a 3-1 loss to the Mets. "I think I had a tear planted in the corner of my eye basically all night. It's pretty tough to hit when you're misty like that.... It's so overwhelming. And the support and the love in the ballpark tonight was just something that it's hard to prepare yourself for."

Some of that love came from former manager Bobby Cox during pregame festivities. "I simply want to thank Chip for allowing me to be his manager for so many years," Cox said. "Players go through free agency, and many times when free agency came up, Chipper elected to stay loyal to the organization and you, the fans. I want to say to Chipper to keep that rope in his mouth and keep pulling Fredi and his troops to 12 more games and the World Series."

Another World Series would be nice, but one is enough to ensure that Jones has literally done it all. He's an MVP (1999), a batting champion (2008), a division winner, a pennant winner and, to top it all, a world champion. Thanks for everything, Chipper.

Brian Downing



Transfers a "fact of life" in Atlanta

High school coaches in this state have a lot to worry about when it comes to transfers. According to GHSA rules, if a transfer was persuaded at all by "undue influence," schools can be in violation of the transfer and recruiting by-laws. As discussed in a previous story in Score Atlanta, "undue influence" covers a lot of areas

In light of the David Boyd investigation at Milton, one of the state's most prominent basketball programs, the rules regarding transfers and recruiting have been a hot topic of late.

ON THE MOVE ...

In a transient area like Atlanta, schools are almost on top of each other due to population clusters and people are more likely to move for a variety of reasons. One of those reasons is for kids to get the best education, and sometimes, to play for the best local program.

"There's probably not a school in the state that doesn't have somebody move in or some-body leave," said Lassiter coach Jep Irwin. "I think it's just a fact of life in high school football, especially in the metro area where parents are willing to move and it's not that far of a move. ... Parents are more willing to do that and they want to take their kids to a place where they can be successful.

Irwin knows, as his program took in five transfers during the offseason from area programs. The influx of transfers to Lassiter came just one year after running back Tyren Jones left the Lassiter district to move further south in the eastern part of Cobb County to rival Walton, where Jones has starred the past two seasons. While many in the Trojan Nation were furious about the loss of a future star to a rival program, Irwin can understand why families transfer.

"I think transfers are a fact of life. I think

it's the parents' right, if they want to move somewhere and take a kid somewhere, then they just want what's best for their kid," said Irwin. "Obviously, we have a tremendous school just like Walton does, so it's a lot more attractive for someone to think about moving into an area where it's a great place to live and a great school. It's just kind of a trend we're going through right now."

HOOPS HOTBEDS ...

While football coaches are just now adjusting to the trend, basketball coaches have perfected the art of the transfer over the last decade or two. Some of the top high school players in the nation move to better high school programs during their careers, sometimes on multiple occasions.

Making sure the new transfers are enrolled and moved in according to GHSA rules is of high importance to Wheeler's Doug Lipscomb and Norcross' Jesse McMillan, coaches of two of the top programs in the state.

McMillan detailed the process Norcross uses to make sure all Blue Devils transfers are handled well within GHSA rules.

"Basically what happens, and what is normal, is when the parents call the school or come by the school to talk, normally, they're directed to our counseling office and our athletic director, and they'll sit and talk to the athletic director and he'll lay everything out as far as what the requirements are for admissions," said McMillan. "So the counseling department will provide them with the requirements they need to gain admission, which is the residency in our district, the proof of utilities and the official withdrawal

from the previous school."

Lipscomb goes far to make sure his kids are moved into the Wheeler district.

"I'm going to take (the player) home and make sure that's where he lives," said Lipscomb. "I don't have a problem with giving a kid a ride home.'

While transfers remain a growing trend in high school athletics, investigations are rare, which shows that most coaches and programs do take the right path to success.

Titans, Bulldogs set for region showdown

Playoff positioning will be at stake when Blessed Trinity hosts Decatur in a crucial Region 6-AAA matchup next Friday night. The Titans and Bulldogs matchup fiext Friday fight. The Titahs and Buildogs are part of a loaded region that also includes St. Pius X (4-1, 1-0), Cedar Grove (3-2, 1-0) and Woodward Academy (3-2, 0-1), so every game matters as the battle for four postseason spots heats up.

Blessed Trinity (4-1, 1-0) kicked off the season with a 25-20 victory over Westminster and the Titahs have bounced back impressively

from a 24-7 loss to Lovett in their second game. The Titans took care of Hart County and White County, then opened region play by defeating Woodward 21-14 on Sept. 28. Coming off of a bye week, they will be well-rested and energized for Decatur.

STELLAR SENIOR ...
The Titans are led by senior quarterback Spencer McManes, who struggled against Lovett, but has otherwise been stellar. McManes has completed 37 of 82 passes for 509 yards, six touch-downs and six interceptions. In four wins, he has completed almost half of his attempts while throwing for six scores compared to just two picks. Mc-Manes spreads the wealth around, having tossed all six touchdowns to six different receivers. But his favorite target is senior Sam Roberts, who has 14 receptions for 264 yards and a score. On the ground, freshman running back Milton Shelton

has torched opposing defenses for 431 yards and

nas torched opposing defenses for 431 yards and three touchdowns on 80 carries.

Decatur (3-2, 0-1) lost its opener to Grady and fell to Cedar Grove on Sept. 29, but in between those setbacks the team reeled off three straight wins—at the expense of Therrell, Greenville and Clarkston. The Bulldogs hosted Woodward on Friday night, but results were not available at press time. available at press time.

DUAL THREAT ...

An effort to stop Blessed Trinity's attack will be spearheaded by junior cornerback Terryon Robinson, who suffered a high-ankle sprain in early September, but looked close to 100 percent when he picked off two passes against Cedar Grove.

he picked off two passes against Cedar Grove. Robinson also returned an interception 101 yards for a touchdown in a 46-7 blowout of Therrell. Robinson stars on offense as well, along with fellow receivers Perez and Terez Cowan, who are identical twins. Highly-touted sophomore quarterback Devontae Carter is dangerous by himself, but with those weapons at his disposal he is an even bigger threat on every play. Additionally, Blessed Trinity will have to watch out for halfback Elijah Rachel and fullback Nic Bentley, who also roams the middle of Decatur's defense at linebacker.

The Hawks have spent their first few days of training camp trying to get all of their new players integrated into their system and begin building chemistry on and off the floor. The players and coaches have been keying in on the Hawks' speed and ability to run the floor at all five positions. During media day, everyone associated with the team sounded extremely excited about the offense's potential and the new up-tempo style.

UP-TEMPO OFFENSE ...

The offense will be predicated on motion and pick-and-rolls that will take advantage of this year's guards' speed, all of the new outside shooters that space the floor and the athletic, goodshooting bigs on the roster. The Hawks will apply a lot of pressure on opposing defenses with the ability of guards like Lou Williams, Jeff Teague and Devin Harris to get the ball from end-to-end as quickly as any backcourt in the league.

While the offense is expected to come around, Larry Drew is ensuring that the focus

of camp is on the defensive side of the ball.
"My focus [is] to set the tone for who
we're going to be on the defensive end," said

Drew. "As I told the guys [Monday night] after dinner, I think we're a very capable scoring team. We have to establish ourselves on the defensive end and that's going to be our mindset

That defensive identity will hinge on the Hawks' speed and length. They will look to jump passing lanes, apply pressure to and harass ball-handlers, and use their length and athleticism inside to block shots.

BIG QUESTION ...

The biggest question facing Drew will be whom he plays at small forward. Drew is coming into camp without any real idea of what his rotation will be at the three and he is hoping someone steps up into that role. The options for Drew are numerous, whether he goes big with Josh Smith or Anthony Tolliver or small with Anthony Morrow or Deshawn Stevenson. None of those options represents a true small forward, though, and all will present issues, especially defensively, depending on matchups. Sunday's game will be extremely important to see where Drew will go because the best three in the league, LeBron James, will present an extremely tough challenge for the Hawks.

Ryan was sacked seven times after going down just four times through the first three games, as the line could barely contain Carolina's Charles Johnson. The former Georgia Bulldog motored his way to 3.5 sacks. Facing a relentless Carolina pass rush, the offense implemented tactics to exploit the aggressive-ness of the defensive unit. Offensive coordinator Dirk Koetter relied on Ryan's ability to handle the pressure and sent backs Michael Turner and Jacquizz Rogers out of the backfield as receivers.

Matt did a great job of getting the ball

out quick and the backs were able to keep our offense moving," said Smith.

Up until the fourth quarter, White was the only receiver who had caught a pass, and



Lindsey Harding led the team in scoring and assists throughout the series with 19 points per game and 5.3 assists. Harding felt her team


per game and 5.3 assists. Harding felt her team had to adjust to the playoffs, but wasn't getting as many calls in Game 3.

"I look forward to using the experience I've gained as an executive and active community member in Atlanta to compliment the Dream's terrific on-court success," Preisinger told the team website.

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
