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Oliver issued a King-sized apology to Richt

Immediately following the SEC Championship loss to Alabama, Georgia head coach Mark Richt was met with a confrontation that escalated quickly, and for all of the wrong reasons. Chuck Oliver, 680 The Fan's King of College Football and co-host of the afternoon drive program Chuck & Chernoff, got into it inadvertently with Richt in the post-game press conference.

Oliver: There are some people whether fans, media or whomever else that will maybe want to make further conclusions about you or your quarterback, specifically, in big games. Would you have any response to those people?

Richt: I don't know what you're saying. Why don't you just say it straight up what you're trying to say.

Oliver: People will say that you and Aaron Murray specifically come up short on the biggest stage against the biggest opponents.

Richt: Is that what you're saying or everybody else? If that's what you're saying. Are you saying that?

Oliver: No, I'm saying I hear that every day ... Richt: Well, that's for you to worry about then. If that's what you say, then I'll answer the question. If you think other people are saying that, I'm not worried about that. ... I want to say something else, if anybody thinks our guys didn't play their tail off and Aaron Murray didn't play his tail off, they are crazy. That's unbelievable somebody would even bring that up.

The King responded this past Monday on 680 The Fan that it was "awful, terrible, wretched, horrid judgment" to ask that initial question immediately after a game that left many Georgia players and coaches drained and unable to leave the field after the game. Oliver apologized in his own way, and said that he had already spoken with Richt, who apologized as well.

THE TRUE PROBLEM ...

While the timing was questionable, the question itself wasn't too over the line. Where The King lost even more footing was when he didn't own up, saying that he believed the opinion, merely that it was what he heard each day on his radio show. Oliver spent most of the prior week questioning when Murray, Richt and company would win a big game such as this one, but to place all of the blame elsewhere when an emotional Richt fired back was something that likely made many listeners lose a modicum of respect for the King of College Football.

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DIVISION DOMINANCE



Falcons conquer South, set sights on NFC

Traditionally one of the most competitive divisions in all of football, the NFC South is defined by a relatively bizarre stat that is both hard to believe but also easy to explain. Not once since its inception in 2002 has the South been won by the same team on back-to-back occasions. Counting this current 2012 campaign, the list of champions has gone Bucs, Panthers, Falcons, Bucs, Saints, Bucs, Panthers, Saints, Falcons, Saints and Falcons. For those counting, that's two titles for the Panthers, three for the Bucs, three for the Falcons and three for the Saints.

Parity may be the story of the NFC South from a historical perspective, but this season the name of the game was complete domination. The Falcons, owners of an NFL-best 11-1 record, clinched the division title last Sunday—with a whopping four weeks to spare. While their single loss came at the hands of a despised division rival (New Orleans), the Falcons' overall body of work—plus a statement revenge win last Thursday, 23-13 over the Saints—more than made up their lone hiccup.

This race was never close. Siphoning the

suspense out of the division as rapidly as air from a balloon, Atlanta led Tampa Bay by one game after two weeks, had a three-game lead through four weeks, built it to 3.5 by the end of Week 5, and held a four-game advantage after seven weeks when no other division leader led by more 2.5 games. Now 12 contests into the season, the Falcons are five up on the Bucs, six up on the Saints and eight up on the Panthers. They made a mockery of their division to an even greater extent than New England in the AFC East and Denver in the AFC West.

NOT DONE YET ...

With four games remaining, the Falcons have not yet clinched homefield advantage throughout the NFC playoffs, nor have they secured a first-round bye. That they have a mathematical chance to accomplish both feats as early as Week 14 (in other words, this Sunday) suggests it is ultimately inevitable barring an unmitigated disaster. Still, for now there is work to be done.

"The last time we won the division I was too amped," third-year linebacker Sean

Weatherspoon wrote earlier this week on Twitter, referring to 2010, when the Falcons clinched the NFC South (and the No. 1 seed) after their final regular-season game only to flame out immediately in the playoffs by receiving a beatdown at home by Green Bay. "This time, it's just like... Ok, now let's accomplish the next goal!"

Four games remain—two against division rivals Carolina and Tampa Bay, one against defending Super Bowl champion New York and another at a Detroit team whose 4-8 record belies its true talent. The Panthers, whom Atlanta visits this Sunday, are out of playoff contention at 3-9 after losing in Week 13 to an emotional Kansas City squad that shares the NFL's worst record with Jacksonville at 2-10. Still, they won't be taken lightly. In the Georgia Dome on Sept. 30, Carolina led 28-27 with just over a minute left and had all but pinned the first loss of the season on Atlanta until Cam Newton fumbled away what would have been a game-ending first down. Instead, the Panthers punted and promptly lost on a last-second Matt Bryant field goal.

"We've certainly got to play better than we did the first time that we played them," head coach Mike Smith said in a Tuesday press conference. "Obviously, we're taking a good hard look at what we did last time and what we need to do this week. They are a team that can create explosive plays in both the run game and the pass game. They have a quarterback (Newton) that we have to account for as a runner."

Over its final four games, Atlanta may only have to account for one team that will still have postseason aspirations for which to play. The Giants, who travel to face the Falcons on Dec. 16, are 7-5 and suddenly locked into a division battle with Dallas and Washington, who are 6-6. They have no chance of clinching prior to facing Atlanta. Detroit is still on life support but must win out to have any prayer at the playoffs. With a game at Green Bay in between now and Dec. 22, Matthew Stafford, Calvin Johnson and company will almost certainly be eliminated by the time the Falcons cruise into the Motor City. Atlanta's regular-season slate ends with Tampa Bay coming to town on Dec. 30. The Bucs, who suffered a tense 24-23 loss to the Falcons on Nov. 25, are 6-6 and may be playing for a wild card.

MAGIC NUMBERS ...

As it stands right now, the other NFC contenders are playing for second place (in

the regular season, of course). That's because not only have the Falcons been taking care of their own business, but they have also been getting help. Chicago and San Francisco, their closest pursuers of late, are struggling. The Bears have dropped three of their last four games and the 49ers have won only two of their last four contests. The Giants have also lost three of four and, although the Packers have won six of their last seven, they are still just 8-4. Atlanta has a 2.5-game lead on the rest of the conference and will clinch the top seed with two more wins regardless of what anyone else does.

"We try not to think that far ahead," Matt Ryan said in his press conference after beating the Saints. "One of things I've learned in my five years is that if you worry about what you're going to do in January, you're wasting your time. We still have four games to go and we try to take them one game at a time."

That is the necessary attitude, especially because Week 14 likely won't bring further clinching. Explaining the permutations and combinations of what has to happen for Atlanta to wrap up a bye, or better yet the No. 1 seed (also mathematically possible), would confound even Albert Einstein. The bottom line, therefore, is that the Falcons would do well simply to keep doing what they've been doing; win.

In Class AAAAAA, Norcross boasts perhaps the top running back in the state in Alvin Kamara. The Blue Devils' running back has been explosive all season long, and last week added "wildcat quarterback" to his impressive resume. Kamara has rushed for more than 1,900 yards and 24 touchdowns this year and is trying to decide between Alabama and Georgia. Norcross also boasts running back/receiver Myles cross also boasts running back/receiver Myles Autry, cornerback Shon Akins and defensive end Lorenzo Carter.

Colquitt County has its own set of play-makers in quarterback Cole Segraves and wide receiver Bobby Hill. Segraves is mulling over his options while Hill has already pulled the

trigger on a pledge to Ole Miss. In the trenches, Octavius Jackson, Rush Propst's big offensive tackle, is headed to Florida.

In Class AAAAA, Gainesville boasts the best player in the classification and perhaps the state, regardless of grade. Junior quarterback Deshaun Watson has accounted for 68 touchdowns on the year. Last week against Harris County, Watson tallied 572 total yards with seven scores. He has given a pledge to Clemson, but after this incredible season, he could be tempted to look around. tempted to look around. Northside-Warner Robins' Keshun Hill and

Whitewater's Kendall Conley are other special offensive standouts that should be followed throughout the semifinal action.

The talent in Class AAAA is spread out across all of the teams as Sandy Creek, Monroe Area, Marist and Ridgeland each have interesting prospects. Sandy Creek's Shaq Wiggins, a defensive back headed to Georgia, and junior wide receiver Demarter Kitt are at the top of the wide receiver Demarre Kitt are at the top of the list, but don't sleep on lineman Alan Knott and junior quarterback Cole Garvin. Braves add Upton to potent lineup

The Atlanta Braves can now close the door on bringing back Michael Bourn as the team announced last week the signing of free agent center fielder B.J. Upton. The 28-yearagent center helder B.J. Upton. The 28-year-old spent the last eight seasons with the Tampa Bay organization after being selected No. 2 overall in the 2002 draft. Last season, Upton appeared in 146 games, racking up 141 hits with 28 home runs and 78 RBIs while hitting .246. He did strike out 169 times, but he man-aged a .298 on-base percentage with a .454 slugging percentage. Upton also showed some speed, stealing 31 bases in 37 attempts.

Conversely, Bourn, who will turn 30 on Dec. 27, managed a .348 on-base percentage with 42 stolen bases in 55 chances. His slugging percentage paled in comparison, registering just 391, and Bourn struck out 155 times. His power numbers were nowhere as close as he finished with just nine home runs and 57 RBI

Upton will be an upgrade over Bourn after becoming the only player in Major League Baseball since 2007 to hit at least 100 home runs and steal 200 bases. He has averaged 19 home runs, 71 RBIs and 36 steals per year over the past six seasons.

"We are thrilled to add B.J. Upton to our club," said Braves GM Frank Wren in a release put out by the team. "B.J. is an outstanding defensive player who also adds the power dimension to our offense from the center fielder position. We have been working to increase the speed and athleticism across our team and B.J. gives us another young, dynamic player." namic player.

OTHER CHANGES ...
The Braves didn't stop making moves after signing Upton. The team re-upped shortstop Paul Janish to a one-year deal to avoid arbitration. Janish was acquired last year when Andrelton Simmons went down with an injury. He played well defensively, but recently had surgery on his left shoulder. He is expected to be back possibly by late April.

The Braves also traded pitcher Tommy Hanson to the Angels for former All-Star setup man Jordan Wälden. He recorded 32 saves in 2011 but served in middle relief last season. Finally, the team chose not to tender contracts to Peter Moylan and Jair Jurrjens.
