HALL OF FAME'S 2020 CLASS FILLED WITH BIG NAMES, GREAT ATHLETES

The second class of the Lakeside High School Sports Hall of Fame will have 35 members inducted into its Class of 2020 and includes athletes from a range of different sports and points of time in the school's 56-year history. During the red-carpet ceremony, each inductee will receive a Hall of Fame jacket, medallion and plaque.

Completing the Class of 2020 came after the selection committee received more than 150 nominees, and the 35-member class consists of 10 football inductees in addition to multiple inductees in the sports of basketball, baseball, soccer, cross country, tennis, swimming, track and field, gymnastics and wrestling. There are also three coaches joining the Hall of Fame in this year's Class.

A NEW AWARD TO BE GIVEN

In addition to the John Kicklighter Award, which is given to a person who was instrumental in Lakeside's success off the field, there will be an award given each year to a cheerleader. The late Beth Cooley-Jordan is the recipient of the inaugural Cheerleading Award and will be inducted into the Hall as one of this year's 35 incoming members. This honor will also be named after Cooley, who was a graduate of the Lakeside Class of 1982. Cooley cheered while attending Lakeside and went on to the University of Georgia where she was a cheerleader and graduated Cum Laude from the University of Georgia's Terry College of Business. Beth passed away in October of 2017 after a long battle with brain cancer.

The John Kicklighter Award for 2020 will go to Joe Willingham, who was involved in Lakeside athletics for many years as well as being instrumental in the forming

of Briarcliff Community Sports, which feed Lakeside many of its athletes. Willingham also was a longtime member of the Dekalb County School Board.

Also, the class will include former Dekalb County School Board member Jim McMahan, who died in a boating accident last summer. While McMahan went to Northside High School, he was instrumental in the birth of the Lakeside Hall of Fame. He helped set the groundwork for the Hall of Fame to work closely with the school's Foundation as well as helping build the Hall of Fame wall outside the cafeteria. Football still carries the class.

FOOTBALL STILL CARRIES THE CLASS

Last year's inaugural class had 30 members and included 11 total football inductees. This year's group will add to that gridiron prowess with its 10 newest members. Among the incoming football standouts are 1978 All-State running back Melvin Dorsey and the quarterback of the Vikings' successful 11-3 1978 team, Mark Fleetwood. Defensive end and 1991 NFL First Round Pick Huey Richardson is also joining the Hall of Fame. Richardson took his talents to the University of Florida following his varsity career and was enshrined in the University's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2003 as one of the all-time "Gator Greats."

Richardson is being joined in the Class of 2020 by former Gator and Lakeside track and field standout Stephen Ott. While at Florida, Ott competed in the high jump and he won the SEC title in 1977. Ott's abilities gave him the opportunity to competing alongside two-time Bronze Medalist and Olympic high jumper Dwight Stone.

FOOTBALL INDUCTEES

DAVID HENDERSON

Henderson, Class of 1976, earned four varsity letters as a multisport athlete, two from both football and baseball. As quarterback and co-captain on the football team during his senior season, he was the WSB Metro Atlanta All-Star Football Team quarterback and an AllDeKalb County selection.

Following his graduation from Lakeside, Henderson received a football scholarship to go play at Furman University. There, he was a four-year letterman that

Garnham, Class of 1977, earned three varsity letters while playing on the Lakeside football team. A multipurpose athlete, he played running back, fullback and inside linebacker for the Vikings and also played basketball and baseball.

He continued his football career at the Northeastern Oklahoma A&M College as a fullback and blocked for tailback James Wilder, who played in the NFL for 11 years. Garnham transerred to Auburn University

O'Neal, Class of 1975, earned seven varsity letters, four with the baseball team and three with the football team. On the diamond, he hit.301 lifetime at Lakeside, but where O'Neal made his biggest impact was on the football field.

As a sophomore in 1972, O'Neal started at fullback on the 14-0 state championship team that beat Central Macon for the title. He nearly won a second state title as a senior, but Lakeside lost 26-20 in the final to

Elder, Class of 1973, participated in track and field while being a three-year starter for the football team. He won a 1969 track and field team championship before adding two football state titles.

Elder helped lead the Vikings to their first state championship in football as a sophomore receiver in 1970, finishing 13-0 and beatingRichard Academy in the title game. The Vikings went 14-0 and beat Central-Macon in the championship during his se-

Fleetwood, Class of 1979, earned varsity letters playing football and soccer while attending Lakeside. As a two-year starter for the football team, he was the 1977 DeKalb All-County First Team punter and an All-State quarterback on the Vikings' 1978 semifinal team. As a four-year starter on the soccer team, Fleetwood was one of the leading scorers on the 1978 State Championship team that went 14-0 through the season. He ended his high school career with 75 goals and 55 assists.

MARK FLEETWOOD

Fleetwood went on to kick for the University of South Carolina football team after graduation. As a Gamecock, he kicked the longest field goal in school history, a 58-yarder coming against Georgia that is still the record to this day. He is currently 10th all-time in points scored for the Gamecocks and made 39 of his 53 attempted field goals.

After leaving Columbus, Fleetwood received a shot in the NFL and was picked up by the Dallas Cow-

boys as a free agent.

Today Fleetwood is the acting dean of students, athletic director and head football coach at Huntsville High School in Alabama. His teams have reached the state playoffs six of his ten years with the school and more than 65 of his players have signed college football scholarships. He has been married for 25 years to Kimberly Gilmore and they have a 20-year-old daughter, Irelan.

Richardson, Class of 1986, was a multisport athlete during his time at Lakeside. He earned six varsity letters, one in track, two in basketball and three on the football team.

He continued his football career at the University of Florida, playing outside linebacker and defensive end for the Gators.

His efforts on the field earned him the title of Con-

Kurland, Class of 1973, moved to Atlanta a week before his junior year and finished out his high school education as a Lakeside Viking. He started on the varsity basketball and varsity football teams for two seasons, and was named DeKalb County Defensive Player of the Week three times. He was a defensive star on Lakeside's 1972 State Championship Team, which gave up only 35 points in 10 regular season games and finished 14-0.

Carmichael, Class of 1969, was a three-year starter on the football team. He was an All-County athlete and an All-State honorable mention during his senior year. He rushed for an incredible 19.4 yards per carry and snagged 37 receptions for 712 yards during his senior season, reaching the end zone 15 times. Carmichael lettered in football, track and baseball.

He received scholarship options from Vanderbilt, Georgia, Clemson, Auburn and Kansas, but ultimate-

Bowen, Class of 1974, played middle linebacker for the Vikings' 1972 undefeated state championship team and earned the honor of being selected to the Class AAA All-State team the same season. Lakesides defense allowed just six points per game during their 14-0 run to the 1972 State Title and just 3.5 points per game during a regular season that included six shutouts.

During his senior season, Bowen became co-cap-

Dorsey, Class of 1979, transferred to Lakeside from White County for his senior year of high school where he played one year of varsity football, winning the Carnation Prep All-American Athlete Award and making the Georgia North-South Coaches All-Star Game. He helped lead the Vikings to a state semifinals appearance and rushed for more than 1,600 yards. Behind Dorsey, the Vikings beat Clarke Central, Cedar Shoals and Sprayberry in the playoffs before falling in the semifinals game to Griffin. He was named First Team All-State.

HUEY RICHARDSON

In the 1991 NFL draft, Richardson was picked 15th in the first round by the Pittsburgh Steelers and played two seasons in the NFL.Athletically gifted, Richardson also excelled greatly in school. He became the first player in Gators' history to achieve Academic All-Southeastern Conference Honor Roll during all

From there, Dorsey signed as a free agent with the Kansas City Chiefs. After his brief time in the NFL, he developed a career in the North Carolina Department

of Transportation. He worked there until 2012 before retiring.

Dorsey now resides with his wife of 34 years, Gayronza. Together, they have two children, Brandon and Stiles.

LARRY SALE

Sale, Class of 1973, played basketball for five years and volleyball for two at Lakeside, earning varsity letters while competing in both sports. During his junior season, the basketball team won the Region 8-AAA Championship and during his senior year the team was Class AAA State runner-up. He was the DeKalb County Defensive Player of the Month in December of his senior season. The volleyball team won the state championship that same year and Sale was awarded the school's prestigious Viking Award.

Stewart, Class of 1976, was a six-time varsity letterman in basketball and tennis. In 1975, she helped lead the basketball team to the Class AAA State Championship. The following year, she teamed up with Terri Russell to win the Class AAA State Doubles Tennis Championship, earning her the school's Viking Award for both basketball and tennis.

Stewart was selected to represent the north team in the Georgia Athletic Coaches Association All-Star

Franks, Class of 1979, earned two varsity letters playing for the Lakeside basketball team. As a junior he was voted the team's Most Valuable Player. He went on to average 24.2 points per game and 14 rebounds per game throughout his outstanding senior year that would result in his second Most Valuable Player Award. Franks also played volleyball for two seasons at Lakeside and received the Most Valuable Player Award for both years.

For his accomplishments on the basketball court, he was invited to participate in the annual Coca-Cola 1-on-1 Tournament and he bested the competition with a first-place finish. Altogether, he received 32 total awards from Lakeside High School, the Atlanta Tip- Off Club and the DeKalb Tip-Off Club.

Following his high school graduation, Franks attended college at the DeKalb County Community College. He continued his basketball career, playing two

BASEBALL INDUCTEES

DOUG GILCREASE

Gilcrease, Class of 1978, was a two-year varsity letterman in baseball and soccer. During his senior season, he helped the Vikings take home the 1978 soccer state title.

After graduating high school, Gilcrease went on to play baseball at Mira Costa Junior College. There, he hit .421 and was an All-State shortstop. Gilcrease transferred to Auburn University following his fresh-

man season and continued to flourish on the diamond.

During his senior season, he hit .386 and set the school's single season record for extra-base hits (41) and homeruns (17) which led the Southeastern Conference. In 1982, he was named Auburn's Male Athlete of the Year.

Gilcrease was drafted by the Kansas City Royals in the 7th round of the 1982 MLB Draft and played for five years in their Minor League Farm System.

For the past 30 years, Gilcrease has spent his time with the Athletes in Action, a CRU ministry. 27 of those years were spent as the official chaplain for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers football franchise. He remains married to Stephanie, his wife of 29 years, and together they have six children.

COACH MARVIN PRUITT

Pruitt first arrived at Lakeside in 1977, and started a long career of teaching and coaching that would last until 2014. In 1983, Pruitt was named head coach of the varsity baseball team and led the Viking's to their first state playoff appearance in school history during his inaugural season.

Along with baseball, Pruitt also served as an assistant coach in basketball and football during his tenure at Lakeside. He left Lakeside to teach and coach

at Rockdale County from 1987-92 and returned to DeKalb County in 1993, leading Southwest DeKalb to two state playoff appearances in 1994 and 1995.

Pruitt then took over as head coach for the inaugural Stephenson High School baseball program in 1997.

Pruitt spent four years at Stephenson, eventually landing at his final stop at Redan. As one of the top baseball powers in the state, Redan rose to even greater

heights under Pruitt's leadership as he skippered the Raiders for 14 seasons, winning the school's first and only state championship in 2013 and posting a 291-129-2 record. He finished his career with 510 victories over 31 years as a head coach.

CHEERLEADING INDUCTEE

BETH COOLEY

Cooley, Class of 1982, earned three varsity letters as a cheerleader for the Vikings. As a senior, she was voted co-captain of the cheerleading team. Cooley excelled academically in school as a four-time honor roll student and was a National Honor Society member her senior year. From eighth grade to her senior year, she was an active participant in the Miss Lakeside Court, winning the competition and being crowned Miss Lakeside her senior year.

Following her graduation from Lakeside, Cooley went on to attend college at the University of Georgia with a scholarship from the Miss Georgia National Teenager pageant. She continued to cheer for the Bulldog's varsity cheerleading squad and was a member of the Golden Key National Honor Society.

Cooley graduated from Georgia with a Bachelor of Business Administrations in Management Information Systems in 1986, and used the ensuing years to start a career in consulting before becoming a mother of three. She remained active with the Northside United Methodist Church, and took a role on the Board of Directors at the Refugee Resettlement Services of Atlanta.

TENNIS INDUCTEES

KELLY THURMAN

Thurman, Class of 1976, was the leading man on Lakeside's tennis team. He helped win a tennis state championship for the Vikings in 1975 following a perfect 15-0 season.

He later attended the University of Arizona where he was the 1978 Western Athletic Conference No. 6 Singles Champion and the No. 3 Doubles Champion. The next year, Thurman transferred to the University of Georgia to continue his tennis career.

Groth, Class of 1976, was a prolific tennis player who led Lakeside to a region title in 1976, and capped off the season by winning the Tennis State Championships.

After signing a scholarship to play at Georgia Southern, Groth transferred over to the University of Georgia where he joined the Bulldogs tennis team as a co-captain for three years. While at UGA, he was a part of the 1978-79 Southeastern Conference Cham-

As a Bulldog, he helped lead the team to a 1980 Southeastern Conference Championship title and won the No. 6 Singles in the Southeastern Conference Championship in 1981. He was a part of the nationally ranked tennis team that finished third in the NCAA Tennis Championship during his senior season.

On the pitch, she totaled 45 goals and 44 career assists. Chilton was a four-year starter and was named DeKalb County West Player of the Year and an

Smith, Class of 1978, was a four-year letterman for the varsity soccer team. During his freshman season, he helped lead the Vikings to the 1975 State Championship, taking home the school's third soccer championship in school history. Smith was voted Most Valuable Player as a senior and capped off his high school career with his second state title in 1978.

After graduating from Lakeside, Smith went on the attend college at Emory University. There he was a

NSCAA All-American in 1985 and 1986.

After graduating from Lakeside, Chilton went on to play soccer at Berry College. There, she would be named an NAIA All-American all four years, and the MVP of the NAIA Tournament during Berry's 1987 National Championship run. Chilton ended her collegiate career at Berry with 72 goals and 26 assists.

Chilton earned a degree in Middle School Education from Berry. Following graduation, she returned to DeKalb County where she taught elementary school and coached soccer at Lakeside from 1992-1999. Roberts, Class of 1980, was a prolific soccer player during his years at Lakeside High School. In his senior season, he was named DeKalb Ctounty Most Valuable Player and Lakeside's Most Valuable Player. His talents also resulted in being named to the All-Dekalb County team and earning All-American recognition.

In 1979, Roberts played for the U.S. National Under 19 team and also competed at the National Olympic

Creviston, Class of 1976, was a four-year letterman for the Viking's soccer team, starting each year as the team's goalie. He helped lead the team to backto-back state titles in 1974 and 1975, shutting out Westminster 4-0 and besting Henderson 4-1 in the championship games, respectively and was considered the top goalkeeper in Georgia. His efforts on the pitch led him to being named All-State and a DeKalb County All-Star.

He finished second at the state championship his sophomore, junior and senior seasons, and helped the Vikings take home the Cross Country State Title in 1970, 1972 and 1973.
